

THE BIBLE IS BLACK HISTORY

THE BIBLE IS BLACK HISTORY. THIS STATEMENT MAY SEEM CONTROVERSIAL TO SOME, AS THE BIBLE IS OFTEN VIEWED THROUGH A EUROCENTRIC LENS. THE PEOPLE OF THE BIBLE

SEVERAL BIBLICAL FIGURES HAVE AFRICAN HERITAGE OR CONNECTIONS, WHICH UNDERSCORES THE SIGNIFICANCE OF BLACK HISTORY WITHIN THE BIBLICAL NARRATIVE:
