INDIGENOUS PEOPLES AND AFRICAN SLAVES COMPRISED THE LOWER STRATA, OFTEN SUBJECTED TO HARSH LABOR CONDITIONS IN ENCOMIENDAS AND HACIENDAS. THE ECONOMY RELIED HEAVILY ON SILVER MINING AND AGRICULTURE.

CULTURAL AND RELIGIOUS IMPACT

SPANISH COLONIZATION BROUGHT CHRISTIANITY, PRIMARILY CATHOLICISM, WHICH WAS IMPOSED ON INDIGENOUS POPULATIONS. MISSIONARY EFFORTS LED TO WIDESPREAD CONVERSIONS, BUT ALSO TO THE SYNCRETISM OF NATIVE AND EUROPEAN BELIEFS. SPANISH LANGUAGE AND CUSTOMS GRADUALLY BECAME DOMINANT, SHAPING THE CULTURAL IDENTITY OF MEXICO.

WAR OF INDEPENDENCE
